1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – SEPTEMBER 3, 2015 REGULAR MEETING

2. REVIEW OF DELI FRANCHISE REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL (RFP) PROCESS AND TIMELINE

BACKGROUND:

Staff was previously instructed by the Facilities Committee to prepare a Request for Proposal (RFP) to solicit submissions for a franchise to provide deli and snack bar services at the Courthouse and the DSS Building.

Limitations for prospective franchisees include the absence of a vented cooking hood at both locations. This will require any cooking equipment to have an approved built-in filtration system with fire suppression capabilities. The restricted hours of operation also

serve as a potential limitation (i.e., Monday-Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., excluding weekends and County holidays). The current franchisee owns all non-fixed appliances and kitchen equipment at both locations and also the dining room furnishings at the Courthouse location.

Requirements include:

- Must maintain a Grade A Health Inspection Rating
- Must pay a percentage of monthly earnings or a minimum of \$500 whichever is greater
- Must maintain a point-of-sale system and accept credit and debit cards
- Proof of insurance

Evaluation criteria include:

- Five (5) years of deli/restaurant experience
- Evidence of stable financial position
- Acceptable menu and pricing
- Adequate references

RECOMMENDATION

Approval to move forward with an RFP process for a deli and snack bar franchise.

Tracy Jackson, Assistant County Manager, reviewed the background information and recommendation as recorded above. Mr. Jackson reviewed the projected timeline below for the Cumberland County Deli and Snack Bar – Request for Proposals:

Commissioner Keefe asked how the figures were verified. Ms. Cannon, County Manager, stated Tammy Gillis, Internal Auditor, has done two internal audits in the past year to review the sales information and cash register tapes. Melissa Cardinali, Assistant County Manager, stated Ms. Gillis verifies the information by looking at receipts printed from the cash register and compares with the information submitted to the County Finance Department to make sure there are no discrepancies. Commissioner Keefe stated he feels the verification process could be improved.

Commissioner Keefe stated he feels the space in the Courthouse is worth more than \$500 a month to the County. Commissioner Keefe further stated he feels the RFP process should be done every few years to give other businesses an opportunity to utilize the

space. Ms. Cannon stated she feels the Deli is used and provides a service to many citizens using the Courthouse.

MOTION: Commissioner Keefe moved to recommend to the full board approval of

the RFP process for a deli and snack bar franchise.

3. CONSIDERATION OF A RESOLUTION FOR THE APPROVAL OF THE FINAL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE OVERHILLS PARK WATER & SEWER PROJECT

BACKGROUND:

The Public Utilities Division of the Engineering & Infrastructure Department received notification from the United States Department of Agriculture – Rural Development (USDA-RD) of their intent to fund the installation of sewer within the Overhills Park Water & Sewer District on August 8, 2014. The project funding consists of a loan in the amount of \$819,000, a grant in the amount of \$2,503,000 and a County contribution of \$50,700 for a total project cost of \$3,372,700. Recently USDA-RD notified the Public Utilities Division that the plans and specifications have been reviewed and prior to providing written authorization to bid the project, the Overhills Park Water and Sewer District must submit, in accordance with the Water and Wastewater Docket (WWD) Processing Checklist, a signed resolution providing approval of the final plans and specifications in order to move forward with this project.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The Engineering and Infrastructure Director along with County Management recommend that the Facilities Committee approve the resolution and place it on the agendas of the October 19, 2015 Board of Commissioners and Overhills Park Governing Board meetings for approval.

Jeffery Brown, Engineering and Infrastructure Director, reviewed the background information and recommendation as recorded above. Mr. Brown stated this project will provide sewer to a community without a sanitary sewer system in the Overhills Park Subdivision. Mr. Brown stated 75% of the cost of the project is grant money and 25% of the cost of the project is a loan that will be paid back over a 40 year term with a low interest rate. Mr. Brown further stated the availability fee has not been set yet but should be between \$12-\$14 and that cost will go towards the payment of the loan.

Mr. Brown explained the USDA has approved the plans but needs a resolution by the governing board that the board is in agreement with the plans. Mr. Brown further explained once the resolution is approved and sent back to the USDA the County will be able to bid the project.

MOTION: Commissioner Lancaster moved to recommend to the full board approval

of the resolution for the approval of the final plans and specifications for

the Overhills Park Water and Sewer Project.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe VOTE: UNANIMOUS (2-0)

4. A) APPROVAL OF LEASE AGREEMENTS: MID-CAROLINA COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENT

BACKGROUND:

The Mid-Carolina Council of Governments, a quasi-governmental regional agency serving Cumberland, Harnett and Sampson Counties and the municipalities contained therein, wishes to enter into a lease agreement with Cumberland County for 4,070 square feet of executive office space located in the Cumberland County Historic Courthouse, 130 Gillespie Street in Fayetteville. This agreement will take the place of a prior lease that was in need of an update. The rent shall be at an annual rate of \$8,000 the first year (fiscal year 2016); \$12,210 the second year (fiscal year 2017); \$16,280 the third year (fiscal year 2018) \$20,350 the fourth year (fiscal year 2019); and \$24,420 the fifth year (fiscal year 2020). Mid-Carolina Council of Governments provides transportation, planning and other services such as administering the Area Agency on Aging which provides various programs and advocacy for those sixty (60) years of age and older in our region.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Staff recommends approval of the proposed lease agreement.

Mr. Jackson reviewed the background information and recommendation as recorded above. Mr. Jackson stated the proposed lease will be for five (5) years and the rent amount will escalate.

Commissioner Keefe stated he feels he has not been briefed on the services that the Mid-Carolina Council of Government provides and would like to see a presentation. Commissioner Keefe further stated he does not know if this is the best utilization of the space in the Historic Courthouse. Commissioner Keefe stated he is not prepared to make a motion to support this item at this time.

Ms. Cannon stated she feels the Mid-Carolina Council of Government provides a valuable service to the elderly in the community. Ms. Cannon stated she will have a discussion with the Mid-Carolina Council of Government and will invite them to the next Facilities Committee meeting to provide a report regarding services.

MOTION: Commissioner Lancaster moved to delay recommendation of the Mid-

Carolina Council of Government lease until the November Facilities

Committee meeting.

4. B) APPROVAL OF LEASE AGREEMENTS: COMMUNICARE

BACKGROUND:

Communicare, a local not-for-profit agency that assists people in overcoming mental health problems, substance abuse/chemical dependency, and the trauma of sexual victimization and abuse, wishes to enter into a lease agreement with Cumberland County for 13,994 square feet of office space located at 109 Bradford Avenue in Fayetteville. This agreement contains terms that mirror the prior agreement between Communicare and Cumberland County and will take the place of that agreement which will expire October 31, 2015. The agreement also continues to recognize the in-kind services that Communicare provides to the County. The rent is proposed at an annual rate of \$41,308 and will be for a three-year term.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Staff recommends approval of the proposed lease agreement.

Mr. Jackson reviewed the background information and recommendation as recorded above. Commissioner Keefe asked Mr. Brown to provide utility bill information for this location.

BACKGROUND

Alliance Behavioral Healthcare, the managed care organization that provides mental health services for the citizens of Cumberland County, wishes to enter into a lease agreement with Cumberland County for 16,995 square feet of office space located at 711 Executive Place in Fayetteville. Alliance Behavioral Healthcare is seeking approval to renovate the first and second floors of the building and would like assistance from the County in the form of a waiver of rent for six (6) months in the amount of \$112,924 and the use of carryover funds from a prior year in the amount of \$387,076 for a total County contribution of \$500,000. Preliminary cost estimates obtained by Alliance Behavioral Healthcare for renovations are projected to be approximately \$1.2 million.

The term of the lease will be three (3) years initially, with two (2), two (2) year extensions for a total of seven (7) years. The effective date of the lease agreement will be January 1, 2016. If approved, the rent will be waived for the first six (6) months of the lease and thereafter will be \$16,995 per month for the remainder of the lease. Lease revenue for FY15 has only been budgeted for the first half of the fiscal year.

RE: Renovation of Winding Creek (711 Executive Place)

This memo details Alliance Behavioral Healthcare's proposal to renovate the office space currently occupied at 711 Executive Place under a cost-sharing arrangement with Cumberland County. Alliance has occupied this space since the merger between Cumberland Mental Health and Alliance on July 1, 2013. Alliance staff occupy the first and second floor and share meeting and storage space on the fourth and fifth floors.

Alliance leadership recently completed a walkthrough of the space with Cumberland County management with the goal of understanding the current architecture of the building as well as the scope of redesign necessary to optimize future use of the space. While our occupancy of the property has shared benefit for both Alliance and Cumberland County, including continuity of operations for stakeholders who visit the building, Alliance has significant concerns regarding the current layout with respect to security, usage of space, and design.

As a result of the walkthrough, Alliance has a proposed design that would:

- Result in occupancy of only the first and second floors.
- Allow for secure space for Alliance staff in compliance with URAC and safety standards.
- Allow for open common area on first floor for other tenants.
- Rebrand the space per Alliance guidelines.

Alliance requests that the County contribute 50% of the final cost of renovations not to exceed \$500,000, broken down as follows:

- Alliance is permitted to occupy the space rent-free from January through June, 2016 (cash value \$112,924).
- Cumberland County allows Alliance to utilize the remaining \$387,076 from the County fund balance it currently holds.

Additional costs would be absorbed by Alliance.

We appreciate the County's ongoing partnership in serving its citizens and look forward to the opportunity to speak with the Facilities Committee on November 5 and the Board of County Commissioners on November 16.

BACKGROUND

This item was originally introduced at the October 1st Facilities Committee Meeting. No action was taken at that time so that a representative from the Mid-Carolina Council of Governments (MCCOG) could be present to answer questions at the November Facilities Committee meeting. MCCOG, a quasi-governmental regional agency serving Cumberland, Harnett and Sampson Counties, and the municipalities contained therein, wishes to enter into a lease agreement with Cumberland County for 4,070 square feet of executive office space located in the Historic Cumberland County Courthouse.

This agreement will take the place of a prior lease that was outdated, and the intent was to gradually increase the lease rate over time to minimize the impact on services. The rent shall be at an annual rate of \$8,000 the first year (fiscal year 2016); \$12,210 the second year (fiscal year 2017); \$16,280 the third year (fiscal year 2018); \$20,350 the fourth year (fiscal year 2019); and \$24,420 the fifth year (fiscal year 2020). MCCOG provides services which include the administration of an array of aging programs. These aging programs include adult day health

care, transportation, in-home aides, home-delivered meals, information and consumer services, housing and home improvements, and advocacy for those 60 years of age and older.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Staff recommends approval of the proposed lease agreement due to the importance and value of the services provided to senior adults in our local community.



Information and Referral

Information and Referral provides information on community services for the 60+ population in order to keep them in their own homes and as independent as possible. A brief assessment is made to determine the most appropriate resource to meet the stated needs of the person requesting services, then referral is made to the most appropriate community resource.

Care Management

Mid-Carolina Area Agency on Aging continued to provide Care Management services to the highrisk, frail, and non-Medicaid eligible older adults who wish to continue living at home. Referrals of individuals in need continue to come in from home health agencies, concerned family members, the Department of Social Services including Adult Protective Services, and other aging service providers.

- In fiscal year 2014-2015 Care Management provided 5,354 hours of in-home personal care services to 22 clients in Cumberland County. Emergency Response systems were provided to 4 clients in need of this personal security service.
- Consumer Directed Services is a fairly new program in North Carolina that gives a new option to the homebound client. It is based on a belief that people with disabilities should be empowered to have greater autonomy and control over what services they receive, and from whom, when and where. Consumers choose and employ their workers, decide how and when services will be delivered, and provide feedback about how well the services are working for them. Mid-Carolina AAA provided coordinator and in-home services to 11 Cumberland County residents with a desire to direct their own care.

Family Caregiver Support Program

The Family Caregiver Support Program (FCSP) continued to provide services to family caregivers and grandparents raising grandchildren in our region. With a regional budget of \$204,334 Mid-Carolina AAA was able to accomplish the following:

- 90 face to face outreach/educational activities with 4,500 participants
- ♦ 60 media outreach/educational activities with an estimated audience of 160,000
- ♦ Leveraged resources of \$11,351.21 for the region
- Respite services to 91 caregivers
- Supplemental services provided to 86 caregivers
- Support groups in each county serving 45 caregivers
- In home respite hours provided: 3,364
- Institutional respite hours: 192
- Grandparents Raising Grandchildren respite days provided: 80
- ♦ Adult day care days provided: 26
- Onsumer contributions collected: \$265
- Part time family caregiver specialists in Harnett and Sampson counties
- Alzheimer's Conference held every other year—Next one in 2015-2016

Health Promotion

Promoting activities and ideas that maintains or improves the health and well being of older adults.

- Healthy IDEAS (Identifying Depression, Empowering Activities for Seniors) is an evidence based depression program. Its goal is to help detect depression and reduce the severity of depressive symptoms in older people who are receiving long-term support services through a community agency. Four Mid-Carolina AAA staff have been certified in this program. Mid-Carolina AAA provided screening and intervention assessments to 34 Cumberland County residents.
- Living Healthy and Living Healthy with Diabetes is a free six week evidence based class designed to help individuals with chronic diseases/diabetes better manage their chronic conditions and live healthier, happier lives. Two Mid-Carolina AAA staff have been certified as Master Trainers in these programs. Five Living Healthy participant classes were conducted in Cumberland County with 58 participants completing the workshops. One lay leader/train the trainer class was offered with five leaders trained.
- Matter of Balance is an evidence based falls prevention class designed to reduce the fear of falling and increase the activity levels of older adults who have concerns about falls. One Mid -Carolina AAA staff member has been certified as a Master Trainer. One Matter of Balance class was taught in Cumberland County with 14 participants completing. One Matter of Balance coach training was held with 10 coaches trained.

Senior Games

Mid-Carolina Senior Games is part of a network of 53 local games that provide statewide health promotion and wellness programs for adults age 50 years of age and better. Mid-Carolina AAA has been coordinating and hosting our regional games for the past thirty years. Senior Games provide participants with the opportunity for socialization and competition while stressing the importance of wellness and health improvement throughout one's lifetime. Local Games are held annually in the spring with medal winners given the opportunity to participate in the North Carolina Senior Games State Finals.

- Worked with 5 Cumberland County Senior Games Ambassadors
- Lead 7 Senior Games Steering Committee meetings in preparation for our local games, worked throughout year on planning, execution, follow up and evaluations of our local games

LCA Options Counseling

Mid-Carolina Area Agency on Aging serves as the regional Local Contact Agent (LCA) for the skilled nursing facilities in Region M. Three staff members went through the training to become Certified Options Counselors in order to provide this avenue for individual self-determination for nursing home residents. The process allows residents who wish to return to their community to have a support system that helps them make informed choices about long-term services and supports. By researching what services might be available to the client as they transition and recognizing and addressing any roadblocks that may exist, the Options Counselor's ultimate goal is to support the resident's own thoughts and decisions so they can find solutions to their needs and circumstances. Options Counseling was provided to 35 clients, resulting in 7 Money Follows the Person approvals from 8 different skilled nursing facilities in Cumberland County???????

MIPPA—Relay for Extra Help

Mid-Carolina AAA continued to provide community education and assistance to eligible clients with applying for the Medicare Improvements for Patients and Providers Act (MIPPA). In fiscal year 2014-2015 the program was able to accomplish the following:

- ♦ Every Door Direct Mail Event to 6,816 Cumberland County households
- Partnership with Cyprus Elderly Housing Complex—Outreach to 50 households
- ♦ Eight Aging/Disability Community Outreach Events—330 Referrals
- Counseling to eligible caregiver/care recipient during service program assessments

Mid-Carolina Rural Planning Organization Overview

The Mid-Carolina Rural Planning Organization (RPO) provides comprehensive transportation planning services to the portion of Cumberland County not covered by the Fayetteville Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). This includes the Towns of Godwin, Falcon, Linden, Stedman and Wade. In addition to the Towns, the RPO serves the unincorporated areas of the county as shown on the attached map. The RPO also serves Bladen, Sampson, and Harnett Counties.

The RPO was established based on NCGS 136-210 through 136-213. The Mid-Carolina RPO was established in 2001, being the first RPO in the state. The RPO is charged with four core responsibilities by the State of North Carolina:

- Developing, in coordination with NCDOT, long-range, local and regional multimodal transportation plans
- Provide a forum for public participation in the transportation planning and project development process
- Develop and prioritize transportation projects for the Strategic Prioritization Process (SPOT) and State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP)
- Provide transportation related information to local governments and other interested organizations and individuals

In order to carry out the four core responsibilities the RPO develops/provides the following products and services for the area.


- Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
- NCDOT / LPA Funding Agreement
- TCC / TAC Bylaws
- Public Involvement Plan
- Planning Work Program
- 5 Year Planning Calendar

- Final Yearly Narrative
- Quarterly Reimbursement Reports

- TIP Project Prioritization
- Merger Process
- State Ethics Liaison

In addition to the aforementioned standard documents and services, the Mid-Carolina RPO promotes regional coordination in the transportation and land use planning fields. The RPO Director is a member of the FAMPO TCC, the Sustainable Sandhills Combined Air Team, and the Regional Land Use Advisory Committee (RLUAC). The Director of the Mid-Carolina COG also serves as the Vice-Chair of the FAMPO TCC. The RPO staff coordinates with the Cumberland County Planning Department on subdivision, zoning, and development review, area plans, and comprehensive plans. The RPO also coordinates with and supports the Cumberland County Community Transportation Program.

The RPO serves an area of 4 counties and 24 municipalities. The RPO consists of professional staff provided by the Mid-Carolina Council of Governments (COG), a Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) consisting of local staff from member governments and agencies and a Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) made up of elected and appointed officials. The Cumberland County Manager and the Deputy County Planning Director are both members of the RPO TCC.

BACKGROUND

Staff successfully advertised for proposals to operate and provide deli and snack bar services on October 8, 2015 with a deadline for submittal of 10:00 a.m., October 23, 2015. One (1) response to the Request for Proposal (RFP) for deli and snack bar services was received. Attached is a copy of the response to the RFP.

Requirements included:

- Must maintain a Grade A Health Inspection Rating
- Must pay a percentage of monthly earnings or a minimum of \$500 whichever is greater
- Must maintain a point-of-sale system and accept credit and debit cards
- Proof of insurance

Evaluation criteria included:

- Five (5) years of deli/restaurant experience
- Evidence of stable financial position
- Acceptable menu and pricing
- Adequate references

The sole respondent to the RFP process was Mr. Jae Yi, current provider of deli and snack bar services, and his proposal package was compliant in all ways with the specifications of the proposal process. If Mr. Yi is awarded this franchise, staff will work closely with him to improve certain aesthetics of the spaces where deli and snack bar services are provided. The proposed term for the franchise agreement is for a three (3) year period with a renewal option for an additional three (3) years in one (1) year increments (six (6) years in total).

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Staff recommends awarding a deli and snack bar franchise for two locations in County-owned facilities to Mr. Jae Yi and forwarding this recommendation to the full Board for approval on a consent agenda.

The verdict is in: The Happy Deli in the Cumberland County Courthouse has been found not guilty of charging exorbitant prices for its food.

In fact, the most expensive item on the menu is the \$6 Happy Deli club, with most of the sandwiches, salads and other dishes priced below \$5.

The deli, which operates in the basement of the building, has become a mainstay for courthouse employees and those attending courtroom trials and conducting legal business. The deli is open to the general public, but diners need to go through security at the courthouse entrances.

"I have no interest in court cases, but I'm excited every day to see so many different people," said Jay Yi, an Army veteran and native of Korea who manages the business for his wife. Shana.

The couple owns a trio of Happy Deli locations in the area. Jay Yi also oversees those restaurants in the Cumberland County Department of Social Services building and at Stryker Golf Course on Fort Bragg.

He first came to the United States in 1974 from Seoul and joined the military after high school graduation. Before he retired from the Army in 1999, the Yis were running Go & Joy's Pizza and Subs in Spring Lake.

Eleven years ago, they took over the deli in the

courthouse.

These days, breakfast and lunch fare are on the deli docket, with breakfast served from 7:30 to 11 a.m.

The chicken salad sandwich, at \$4.25, is the signature sandwich. "We make it fresh every morning," Jay Yi said.

But customers have come to relish the ham,

tomato and onion omelet (\$4.50); the sausage, egg and cheese sandwich (\$3.15); and the hot dogs (\$2.25, or two for \$4).

A bag of popcorn goes for an unusually priced 92 cents.

"Just for fun," he said with a smile. After all, it is the Happy Deli.

Unlike the speed of most court cases, the food is served up fast. Time can be a factor at the courthouse — with scheduled cases and lunch breaks and 15-minute courtroom recesses. At 55, Yi remains a fleet-footed figure in the kitchen.

"Even when the line's out the door, it takes about five minutes," said assistant manager Kathleen Fleming. "He's like a Ninja."

The deli can seat 45 to 50 people, and Yi said it's often full at lunchtime.

"People come and go," he said. "They say, "Thank you.' They enjoy it."

Among them is Neisha Gilliam, deputy clerk of court. She's a regular.

"They know what I want," she said. "I usually get scrambled eggs with cheese. It's very convenient. Friendly."

The jury has spoken.

BACKGROUND:

Cumberland County participates within the National Flood Insurance Program's (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS). The CRS is a voluntary incentive program that recognizes and encourages community floodplain management activities that exceed the minimum NFIP requirements. The County's participation allows those that are required to have flood insurance to receive discounted insurance premium rates. Cumberland County currently has a class rating of 8 which allows property owners to receive a 10% discount off of their insurance premiums for policies within the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA).

As part of the County's annual recertification process, our Department is required to provide an update on each action item related to floodplain management outlined within the Cumberland County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. Another requirement is that this progress report be presented to the governing board. The progress report is being provided as an attachment to this memo.

Our Department received notification on October 8th that the County's recertification packet had been reviewed and the County was found to be in good standing in the CRS Program for the next year.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The Facilities Committee is not being asked to take action. This purpose of this item is to provide the Committee the progress report as required by NFIP for the County's annual recertification for the Community Rating System.

This report was prepared by the Planning Department under the leadership of Denise Sykes. Denise worked individually with each jurisdiction represented in the plan to gather crucial information that was critical components of the report. A technical committee was formed to drive the formulation of this report. The report was published on the County's website and at various locations around the County. Public hearings were held and each jurisdiction's governing body adopted the plan upon completion.

Provide a review of each recommendation or action item in the action plan or area analysis report, including a statement on how much was accomplished during the previous year:

<u>Unincorporated Area of Cumberland County (only action items related directly to Special Flood Hazard Areas)</u>

<u>Note</u>: The six jurisdictions that the County provides implementation of their Floodplain Development Ordinance (Eastover, Godwin, Falcon, Wade, Linden & Stedman) do not have any additional action items related to SFHA that are not listed below. Therefore, they will not be addressed separately.

Action #1 – Restrict residential and non-compatible uses within the 100-year flood plain

 The County restricts the zoning of the special flood hazard area to Conservancy District (CD) which restricts residential and non-compatible uses.

Action #2 – Increase the lowest floor elevation to 2 feet above the base flood elevation

 The two foot freeboard was adopted by the Board of Commissioners (BOC) in October 2006 with the revised Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance adoption.

Action #3 – Encourage the use of cluster type development to preserve special flood hazard area

 The BOC adopted the revised Subdivision Ordinance on August 19, 2008 which includes the ability for developers to cluster developments.

Action #6 – Develop uniform flood damage prevention ordinance

 Cumberland County's ordinance applies to all jurisdictions within the County with the exception of the City of Fayetteville, the Town of Eastover and the Town of Spring Lake in which have their own flood damage prevention ordinance this is largely the same ordinance. The three jurisdictions that have their own separate ordinance do not participate in the CRS program.

Action #8 – Develop a program to identify and eliminate existing development that is below the 100-yr flood elevation.

• While the County does not have a specific program to mitigate flood prone structures, the NFIP does have such a program and we include this information in our yearly publications that are distributed.

Action #14 – Develop a reforestation program to increase vegetation cover in highly urbanized areas and in denuded areas in flood prone areas.

 Due to limit resources these efforts have been delayed, however efforts have been addressed by the adoption of a landscape ordinance and the provision of the development alternatives that protects vegetation and open space.

Action #15 – Develop a greenway program and encourage low impact uses in those areas as a means to protect natural areas along rivers, stream, creeks, and drainage ways.

 A greenway plan has been developed within the urbanized areas of the County. There is a small stream provision within the County's Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance that addresses small streams outside of the regulated floodplain. Action #16 – Revise Subdivision Ordinance requiring additional access for emergency vehicles and to be used as an evacuation route for developments located near special hazard areas.

- This provision has not been included as part of the Subdivision Ordinance at the current time. Funding of such requirements is the reason in which this provision has not been included within the ordinance.
- 4. Discuss why any objectives were not reached or why implementation is behind schedule:

The reason in which any objective was not achieved has been listed above underneath the action item.

5. What are the recommendations for new projects or revised recommendations?

The County has recently partnered with Hoke County to develop a regional hazard mitigation plan and any new recommendations will be included in the new plan.
